Columbia Conservation District has turned 75 this year!

June 1949 – CCD was born in the wake of the Dust Bowl and Soil Conservation Service to help protect and enhance our precious natural resources.



PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS

In 2023 roughly \$199,000 was allotted for an pivot irrigation project as the Irrigation Efficiencies program has had a recent uplift making the program more viable option for landowners. In 2024, the district approved roughly \$115,000 of its Natural Resource Investment funds for a cattle crossing improvement, stream bank stabilization and irrigation efficiencies project.

Voluntary Stewardship Program (VSP)

"[VSP] offers agricultural landowners farm-friendly options for protecting fragile and/or hazardous natural resources — referred to as "critical areas" — in places where agricultural activity is conducted." (WSCC 2024). This program provides opportunities for landowners to avoid future regulation by voluntarily preserving their natural environment, wildlife habitats, and sources of fresh drinking water through site-specific practices. VSP can be a big help by focusing on results and may open up cost share funding opportunities to accomplish projects. The Columbia County VSP Work Group has set aside \$170,000 in grant funds this biennium to directly benefit area producers through cost-share programs and technical assistance, and are currently looking for new applicants for 2024/2025.

District Board Update

As of July 2024, the Board of Supervisors has a newly appointed member, Zane Patton. Cody Chapman has been reappointed to the board and his term will last until 2027.
